Characteristic Features

Leaves: Featherlike, pinnate leaves that arch gracefully from the stem. The leaflets are narrow and green, giving the palm a feathery appearance.

Trunk: Slender, clustering trunks that are light green to golden yellow in color, especially when young.

Growth Habit: Forms clumps with multiple stems arising from the base, creating a dense and bushy appearance.

Uses


Ornamental: Widely cultivated as an ornamental plant in gardens, parks, and indoor spaces due to its elegant and tropical appearance.

Indoor Plant: Popular as a houseplant or office plant because it tolerates indoor conditions well, though it prefers bright, indirect light.

Outdoor Landscaping: Used in tropical and subtropical landscapes as a specimen plant, in groups, or as a screen or hedge.

Environmental: Provides habitat and food for wildlife in its native habitat.

Cultivation



Climate: Prefers tropical or subtropical climates with high humidity. Can tolerate some degree of drought once established but prefers consistent moisture.

Light: Thrives in bright, indirect light indoors. Outdoors, it prefers partial shade to filtered sunlight.

Soil: Well-drained soil is ideal. Regular potting mix works well for container-grown plants.

Propagation: Typically propagated by seeds, which can take several months to germinate, or by division of clumps.

Maintenance

Regular watering to keep the soil evenly moist. Avoid waterlogging.

Pruning dead or yellowing fronds to maintain its appearance and health.

Toxicity

Generally nontoxic to humans and pets, making it a safer choice for households with animals.
