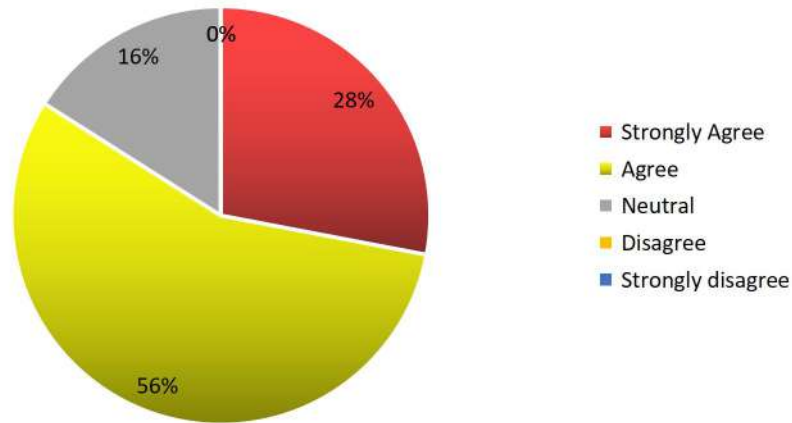

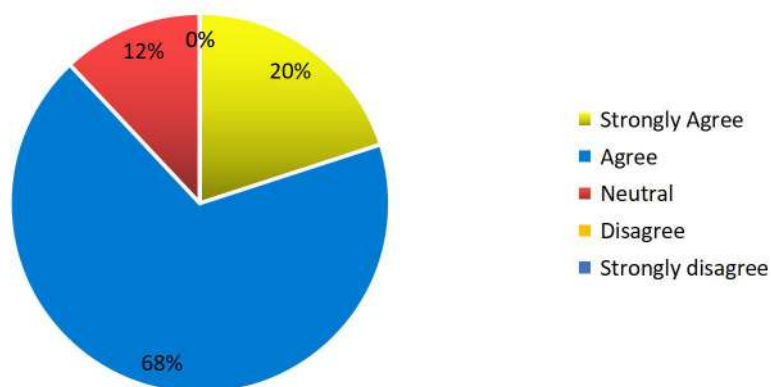


1. How do you rate the quality and relevance of the courses included into the semester?



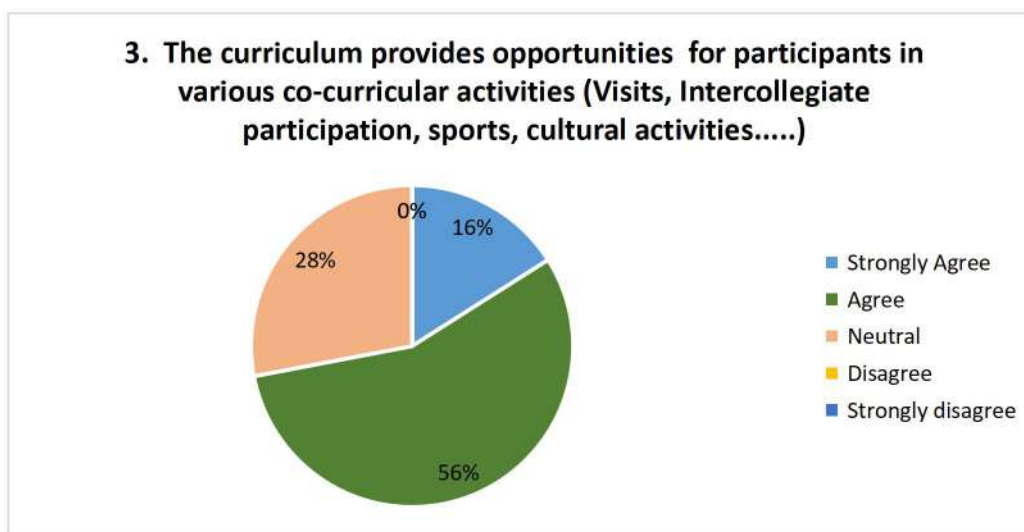

2. How do you rate the courses in terms of their relevance to the latest technologies or future technologies?

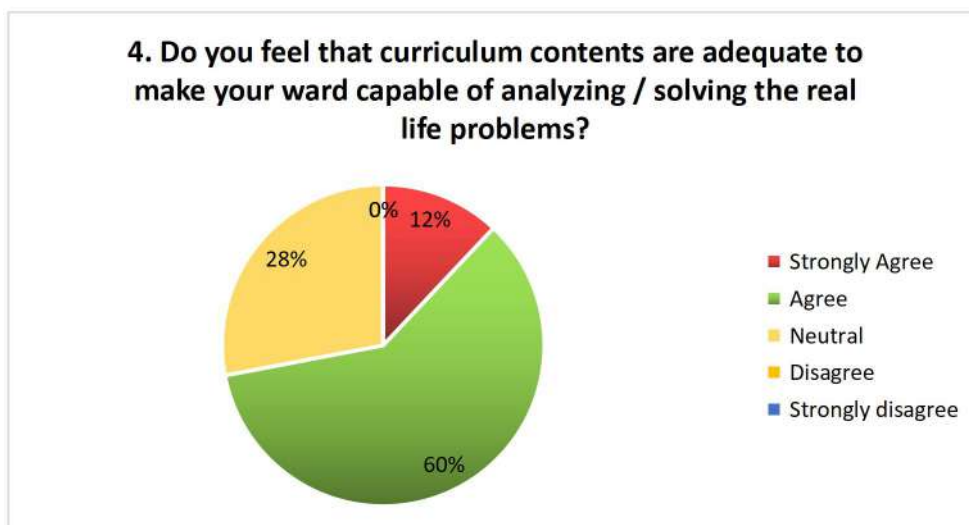
