



ROAD SAFETY PATROL

Policy

- To provide an overview of standard procedures that have made the program easier to implement and more effective.
- All participants should have the highest level of safety possible thanks to the suggested policies.

Practices

There are four stages to the practices. They are listed below. Investigation, consideration, practical use, and competence.

Investigation

- Copy of the student handbook for the Road Safety Patrol must be given to every patroller.
- Review the handbook as a team to ensure that everyone is aware of its contents, including the patrol pledge.
- A review session is held following the patrollers' examination of the handbook. This will provide an opportunity to clarify key points, assess patrollers' comprehension of the subject matter, and pose questions.

Consideration

- After reading and discussing the handbook to gain a basic understanding of conducting investigations, the recruits can proceed to watching the procedures being carried out.
- For a few shifts, each newly formed patrol team should be paired with a buddy patrol from the patrol teams currently on duty. In order to safely learn about traffic and student flows, recruits may "shadow" an experienced patrol team that is on duty. This gives the recruits a chance to ask questions of the current patrollers and observe the procedures being demonstrated (it would be such a good idea to refresh the existing squads in the proper procedures before this observation period).

practical use

- The recruits should rehearse on the college grounds observing multiple periods of observation and training.
- After patrollers perform satisfactorily and can follow instructions, they will be assigned to crosswalk duty.
- It is advised that the current year's Patrol Leader continue to lead the new Patrol Leader of the current year's Patrol Team until the conclusion of the college year.

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Competence

- Provides the campus with accountable cadets who can oversee gate duty under the direction of the instructing officer and with the help of a coordinator.
- Teach, guide, and supervise students as they cross roads close to the colleges.
- Puts in place an educational program for road safety.
- Helps students develop their leadership and interpersonal skills.
- educates students about traffic signs and safety regulations.
